

## Curriculum Vitae

I am a professor of political psychology and the Dean of the Herta and Paul Amir Faculty of Social Sciences at the University of Haifa. My research focuses on the micro-foundations and psychological mechanisms of political conflicts. I am particularly interested in the impact of civilian exposure to terrorism – conventional and cyber - on political behavior. Methodologically, I use controlled randomized lab and field experiments, spatial analysis, survey experiments, bio-political and physiological-political research techniques.
